



Using Video for Teaching and Training - Intensive Course

This 5 day course combines theoretical and practical elements aimed at raising participants' awareness of the value video can bring to teaching and learning, equipping them with the necessary basic skills to create and share their own educational video materials.

Aimed at enthusiastic comers from the teaching and training profession, participants will work in group with the goal of producing their own educational video programme.

The course culminates in an open showcase of the videos to an invited audience. Sessions are a mix of theoretical, practical and site visits to ensure an interesting balance of work. This applies for both basic and advanced training.

All necessary equipment will be provided. You are welcome to bring your own camera and laptop. A selection of resources, materials and tools to enhance your own creation of educational video resources will be available as well as tips and suggestions about how to use existing video-based resources.

Dates

- **2-6 February 2015**, General intro to using video to support teaching and learning (beginners)
- **9-13 February 2015**, Enhancing science teaching through the use of video – an introduction to using video to support the innovative teaching of science in secondary level schools
- **16-20 February 2015**, Video supported language teaching: from creating your own video-based teaching resources to re-using existing video materials in the language class

Practical Information

Courses are held at the Leuven Institute for Ireland in Europe. Accommodation is on-site at the Institute. Leuven is 30 km from Brussels with direct connections from Brussels Airport.

Funding is available to cover training and accommodation costs – see overleaf.

Course and materials are in English.

Number of participants is limited to 20.

Costs and Funding

The full cost of participation in this weeklong residential course is € 1,200 * or € 1,400*, including accommodation, all meals, tuition and materials.

* The course fee costs 750 euros. The trainee has the option of opting for a single room with bathroom (650 euros) or a shared room with bathroom (450 euros).

Funding to cover the full costs of participation including accommodation and meals is available through the Erasmus+ programme. The deadline to apply for funding is 17 March 2014
